FROM THE NORTH – Exit I-5 at #162 (Corson Ave) – Drive 0.8 miles until you come to Michigan St. – Turn Right onto Michigan and drive about one (1) mile until you get to WA-509 – Drive South on 509 a little bit and do a whoop-de-do up to the Right and back over the road to get onto WA-99S – Continue South another 0.3 miles until the traffic signal light at Holden – Turn Left and immediately turn left again on 2nd Ave – Go to the next street and turn Right onto Austin St – You will see the shop/museum on the right.

FROM THE SOUTH – Exit I-5 at #156 (Tukwila/W Marginal Way) – The highway turns into WA-99N – Drive a total of 5.2 miles until you come to a traffic signal light at Holden – Turn (continued on Page 2)

Bill Worman, the founder of KIT Teardrop Trailers, died July 15th of natural causes. Staying at the home of his son, Jack, in Sequim, Washington Bill's health rapidly declined the last few months of his life. Bill was 93.

Bill's high school yearbook says he was the most "studious boy". After graduation, he wanted to get out of Spokane, since there were no opportunities there during the depression years. His dad dropped him off on a hill, where he would most likely be picked up by a slow moving truck driver on the steep upgrade. He ended up in Southern California.

He was a self-learned man, putting together a ham radio as a teen. At the age of 19, he was given an electrician journeyman's book and passed the tests to be a ratio technician. He used this talent to work in the movie industry shortly before the beginning of WWII.

Always being fascinated with airplanes, he quickly moved to management where he oversaw the building of a basic trainer aircraft for the WWII war effort.

Just after the end of the war, Bill developed the most enduring of all teardrop trailers, the KIT. The company name was KIT Manufacturing Company and was headquartered in the shell of an abandoned fruit stand in Norwalk, California. After living in the San Francisco Bay Area for a number of years, Bill permanently retired on Orcas Island, Washington and lived there for 40 years.

Bill lost his wonderful wife, Ione about 18 years ago and is survived by three daughters, two sons and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

2010 LeMay Museum Teardrop Gathering

We were a part of an eight-teardrop caravan that arrived from western Oregon on Friday afternoon. We quickly set up our trailers with the rest of the group (18 teardrops total) on the beautiful Marymount grounds and headed for a burgers and trimmings in the town of Spanaway. This was our first trip to the LeMay Museum and, having heard what a great place it was, we looked forward to our day of touring the grounds and volunteering as museum monitors and docents with great anticipation. We were not disappointed!

As soon as the event was open on Saturday morning, Marty Boehme led this year's group of "newbies" on a tour of the LeMay family's home grounds. There were buildings filled with all types of cars, trucks, automotive memorabilia and dolls (hundreds and hundreds of dolls!) collected through the years by Nancy LeMay, wife of the museum's founder, Harold. Back at the museum grounds we started on the overwhelming task of trying to see everything before our first volunteer shift started at 11:00. There were vehicles on display everywhere! In addition to the hundreds and hundreds of museum and LeMay family vehicles on display, there were many privately-owned antique, classic and hot rod vehicles on display. We were like "kids in a candy store" - Wow!!

We were assigned to work in the "green building" watching to see that the public didn't damage the

vehicles on display, or bring food or drink into the museum. We looked very official in museum hats and shirts provided to the volunteers. The public was very well behaved. We learned a lot just listening to the comments of the public as they looked at the vehicles and discussed the differences between model years, makes, etc. There was a lot of expertise walking around in the museum that day!

We had a continental breakfast in the teardrop display area, and lunch and dinner in the museum's main building that once served as a military boy's academy run by the Catholic Church. Our lunch and dinner were provided by the museum as compensation for our volunteer work. Nancy LeMay spoke before the dinner banquet to very sincerely thank all the volunteers (around 450 total) who made the event a great success.

Most of us teardroppers spent a pleasant evening in our camping area taking pictures, visiting, playing games, and celebrating Grace Abbott's 5th birthday. Meanwhile, other museum volunteers and staff scurried about the grounds taking down the canopies, ropes, structures and other items needed during the show. All the privately-owned show cars quietly disappeared into the early evening twilight. By the time we hit the sack around 11 p.m. very few traces of the event remained. Even the portable potty building set up for our use disappeared into the night. (We had to use the facility in the main building during the evening and on Sunday morning before we departed.).
